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About the Video

Slow Down For Eagles

Introductory Statements: (0:00 - 0:15)

- Eagles are large
- Eagles are very heavy
- Eagles are very slow to get off the ground
- Sometimes they'll eat so much food they can't even fly

First Excerpt: (0:15- 2:08)

Martin and Susan called out about a Golden Eagle that appears injured.

A woman called concerned for its well being.

Martin was able to capture the eagle in order to examine it for injuries.

On capture, he found the eagle had a HUGE crop full of food.

He determined that was the reason the eagle was not able to fly.

He released the eagle in a safe location confident once the food digested, the eagle would fly off fine.

Second Excerpt: (2:08 - 5:33)

Martin and Susan called out to the side of a highway where another Golden Eagle appeared as if it could not fly.

Upon arrival, Martin headed for the eagle that could not get past a low fence along the side of a highway.

Martin captured the eagle with a net.

This eagle also had a huge crop full of food.

Because of this location, which was unsafe, Martin took the eagle back to the rescue center to recover in a safe place from the huge meal.

The next morning, Martin released the eagle back to the wild.

Third Excerpt: (5:33 - 7:11)

Martin, with rescued Eagle Scout, one of his Wildlife Ambassadors.

Martin and Scout travel the Southwest and host Educational Wildlife Presentations.

In a live streamed event in honor of Scout's 15th Anniversary with the Southwest Wildlife Foundation of Utah, Martin shared the story of Scout's rescue.

Scout was a "depredation" animal. That meant a farmer saw him as a threat to his livestock. So Martin was called to take him away from the area.

In this segment, he shares some details about how he captured Scout and what it illustrates about an eagle's flight power.

To ensure him, Martin used a weight of two and half pounds. With that relatively light amount of weight, Scout, a full grown wild eagle, could not fly.

Fourth Excerpt: (7:11 - 7:42)

A little bird darts across the road.

Martin reminds people that this happens while driving so it is important to always stay alert and free from distractions.

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


Healer of Angels

Glossary

Apex Predator

The largest and most dominant predator within their habitat.

Depredation Animal

This refers to wild animals that cause damage.

Golden Eagle

Known as the "The World Eagle". Unlike the Bald Eagle which is only in North America, the Golden Eagle is found around the world. The Golden Eagle name is based on the golden color of the feathers on the back of their heads.

Crop

A crop is an expandable pouch like enlargement where food is stored for later digestion.

Wild Animals

Wild animals are not pets. They are animals best left alone to live their lives in the wild and far away from humans.

Wildlife Ambassadors

Selected wild animals that cannot return to the wild and are kept by trained and licensed wildlife educators for learning purposes.

Wildlife Rehabilitator

Individuals licensed by state and/or federal authorities to tend to injured, sick or orphaned wild animals. Each rehabilitator may specialize in certain types of animals and have very different backgrounds in experience and education. All have the training to handle various critters and should always be consulted when a wild animal appears injured.

Wildlife Rescue Center

A facility to care for injured, sick or orphaned wild animals. They can range in size and structure depending on region and types of animals cared for. Sizes also vary depending on funding sources and affiliations.
